In advance of one of the busiest and deadliest holiday travel times due to alcohol-impaired-driving crashes, the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration today kicked off its annual Labor Day *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* national enforcement mobilization campaign.

R&5 Tipper Cart Audit Completed

The September Utility Bill will reflect if you have an extra tipper cart.

- If you have one tipper cart (65 or 95 gallon from R & S,) then the garbage charge will be \$18.75
- If you have two or more tipper carts (65 or 95 gallon from R & S,) then the garbage charge is \$18.75 plus \$12 for each additional tipper reflected as a separate line item on the bill.

R & S Waste WILL pick up your Recycables from their Recycyling Bins ONLY IF the following rules are followed:

Food & beverage jars and bottles only

- Empty and RINSE jars and bottles
- Throw away the lids
- Labels are okay

Aluminum foil containers, tin food & beverage cans

- Empty and RINSE cans.
- Labels are okay.
- Place lid inside rinsed can.

Clear & colored plastic containers 1&2symbol.

- Empty and rinse all jugs and bottles.
- Throw away all lids.
- Most symbols are on the bottom of the bottle.

 No other numbers!


 Newspapers (including all inserts), phone books,

- Remove all plastic liners from box board containers and <u>flatten the boxes</u>.

- <u>SET OUT ONLY ON DRY DAYS</u> If it is raining, please hold paper items until next recycling day.

IT IS AGAINST OUR CITY ORDINACE

4:19 It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit on any street or sidewalk any yard waste, glass, glass bottle, nails, tacks, wire, cans, trash, garbage, rubbish, litter, offal, or any other debris, or any other substance likely to injure any person, animal, or vehicle.

Fix a Leak Fact Sheet

The Facts on Leaks:

- The average household's leaks can account for more than 10,000 gallons of water wasted every year, or the amount of water needed to wash 270 loads of laundry.
- Household leaks can waste more than 1 trillion gallons annually nationwide. That's equal to the annual household water use of more than 11 million homes.
- Ten percent of homes have leaks that waste 90 gallons or more per day.
- Common types of leaks found in the home include worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets, and leaking showerheads. All are easily correctable.
- Fixing easily corrected household water leaks can save homeowners about 10 percent on their water bills.
- Keep your home leak-free by repairing dripping faucets, toilet flappers, and showerheads. In most cases, fixture replacement parts don't require a major investment.
- Most common leaks can be eliminated after retrofitting a household with new WaterSense labeled fixtures and other high-efficiency appliances.

Leak Detection:

- A good method to check for leaks is to examine your winter water use. It's likely that a family of four has a serious leak problem if its winter water use exceeds 12,000 gallons per month.
- Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, you probably have a leak.
- One way to find out if you have a toilet leak is to place a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If the color shows up in the bowl within 10 minutes without flushing, you have a leak. Make sure to flush immediately after this experiment to avoid staining the tank.

Faucets and Showerheads:

- A leaky faucet that drips at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallonsper year. That's the amount of water needed to take more than 180 showers!
- Leaky faucets can be fixed by checking faucet washers and gaskets for wear and replacing them if necessary. If you are replacing a faucet, look for the WaterSense label.

GOLF CARTS ON CITY OF AVOCA STREETS

- **4.15** Golf Cart Operation on City Streets. It shall be unlawful to operate a Golf Cart upon a public right-ofway unless the following requirements are met:
- A. The Golf Cart is operated on a public street or alley between <u>sunrise and sunset</u>, and
- B. The Golf Cart is equipped with a slow moving vehicle sign and a bicycle safety flag, and
- C. The Golf Cart is equipped with adequate brakes.



ADDITIONALY ALL DRIVERS MUST MEET THE STATE OF IOWA CODE:

Under Code Section 321.174

It is unlawful for anyone to operate a "motor vehicle", including a golf cart, upon streets and high-ways unless the <u>operator has a valid driver's license.</u>

Under Section 321.20B

Golf carts cannot be operated on high-ways or city streets unless <u>financial liability</u> <u>coverage (insurance) is in effect for the vehicle and the</u> <u>driver has proof of insurance in his/her possession.</u>

YELLOW LEVEL WATER MANDATORY WATER RESTRICTIONS Please remember that the recent rainfall is not filling the aquifers that supply the water towers.

Top soil or sub-soil may have benefited from past rainfall, but Regional Water has not removed their restrictions.

- A. Outdoor watering or irrigation of lawns is prohibited.
- B. Outdoor watering of any kind is prohibited between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. daily.
- C. <u>Water or irrigation of flower and vegetable gardens, trees and shrubs less</u>
 <u>than 4 years old, and new seeding or sod is permitted once per week with an application not to exceed one inch.</u>
- D. Car washing is prohibited except in commercial establishments that provide that service.

 In these cases, hours of use will be restricted to 8:00 am to 8:00 PM.
- E. No water shall be used to fill private/residential swimming pools, children's wading pools, reflecting pools, or any other outdoor pool or pond.
- F. No water shall be used to wash streets, parking lots, driveways, sidewalks, or building exteriors.
- G. Large volume water users, including industries, motels, hotels, and eating establishments may be requested to scale back services.
- H. Schools will be required to cancel their physical education activities and inter-scholastic competitions that require showers or attract crowds and take other actions to reduce water consumption at sport complex.
- I. Water shall be served at restaurants only upon the request of the customer.
